

# **Asian People Journal (APJ) Author's Guideline**

## **1. Text Preparation**

For the Asian People Journal (APJ), text should be :

- i. 1.5 Spacing
- ii. A4 size paper
- iii. Times New Roman, 12 points
- iv. Submit in Microsoft Word
- v. Not be more than 10 000 words (around 12-15 pages)

## **2. Authorship**

For the Asian People Journal (APJ), there should be a maximum of five authors in a paper.

## **3. Title**

For the Asian People Journal (APJ), title should be:

### **i. Paper Title**

Times New Roman, 16 points and uppercase letters, centered on the page

### **ii. Heading and Subheading**

Times New Roman, 12 points and Capitalize each word letters, centered on the page

## **4. Abstract**

For the Asian People Journal (APJ), abstract should be:

- i. Not be more than 200-250 words
- ii. One paragraph, self-contained summary of the most important elements of the paper

## **5. Keywords**

For the Asian People Journal (APJ), provide around 3-5 keywords only.

## **6. Acknowledgement**

For the Asian People Journal (APJ), an Acknowledgement should be:

- i. Creates an opportunity for the author to express appreciation to those individuals and institutions involved in the research and the preparation of the paper.
- ii. Include the source of funding and the name(s) of the funding agency/agencies.
- iii. *Example:*  
We would like to express our gratitude to Malaysia's Ministry of Higher Education and Universiti Sultan Zainal Abidin (UniSZA) for funding this research under Special Research Grant Scheme (SRGS RR187).

## 7. Ancillary Materials

For the Asian People Journal (APJ), an Ancillary Materials must come with appropriate captions and should follow these guidelines :

- i. *Illustrations* : 300 dpi or higher in pixel size, JPEG, TIFF or EPS format only, get a official copyright permission.
- ii. *Table* : Prepared using Microsoft Word or Microsoft Excel, proper rows and columns and data inserted using a minimum font size of 8.
